# Annual West 104<sup>th</sup> Street Yard Sale Revolutionizes Bargain Hunting

At the 23<sup>rd</sup> Annual West 104<sup>th</sup> Street Yard Sale on September 29, neighborhood sellers and buyers refined the art of the bargain hunt, transforming the parallel curbsides from West End to Riverside into gallery rows where connoisseurs indulged their caviar tastes with only cream-cheese budgets.



To prepare for the onslaught of collectors and critics, local dealers arrived before 9:00 AM, inhaled the damp air, and surveyed the gray skies. Like a painter considering her palette, each eyed her stock of recycled treasures: jewelry, jackets, dresses, board games, decorative objects, and household items ready for a new setting to enhance their luster. Guided by a classical aesthetic, some arranged their merchandise with careful attention to balance and proportion. Taking an abstract expression approach, others scattered objects and indulged their impulse to "do it as I feel it."

After adding their finishing touches, they assembled at the breakfast counter to plan strategy and to assess their prospects over coffee and bagels. As their public arrived, they held their breath in anticipation of high-pressure hagglers and aggressive bickerers.

By 10:00 AM, the street began to fill with connoisseurs of the rare buy. Wandering from stall to stall, they examined the merchandise and evaluated prospective purchases, appraising value in accordance with deeply held beliefs about the essence of beauty, the enigma of the sublime, the color scheme of their family den, and the tendency of a particular cut or style to make them appear pudgy.

When an item declared its essentiality for happiness in life to a buyer, he approached the dealer and opened negotiations with a clever gambit, such as, "How much?" Frequently, he amplified this stratagem by pointing a forefinger at the item. When the dealer deftly countered by asking how ten bucks sounded, the buyer nodded approval and offered a handshake to seal the deal.

To celebrate, buyer and dealer headed to the refreshment

stand for a hot dog and hamburger with all the trimmings. Arriving, they encountered an array of never-before-offered option: guacamole, tortilla chips, and quesadillas donated to the Block Association by Papasito, Mexican grill and agave bar located on the east side of Bway (104<sup>th</sup>/105<sup>th</sup> Streets).

Fortified with spices and condiments from south and north of the border, they prepared to explore the Yard Sale. From the top of the block throughout the day, they heard strains of live music: the blues of Frank Schaap and Josh Levine, the jazz of guitarist Joe Giglio, the pop tunes of Foley Road, and the soul of Shalah Edwards and the Shaylettes.

Near the performance stage, they dug their way through mounds of second-hand knick-knacks and conversation pieces on the tables of 'What-A-Bargain'—the ultimate bargain basement conveniently located above ground.

Next door, they stopped to purchase a ticket at the 50/50 Raffle, which would collect a total of \$1,745 by day's end and the winner, Abigail Jacob, would receive \$872.50, half the receipts. Before making a purchase at the nearby Bake Sale, they allowed their eyes and imaginations to wander among the unique creations from neighborhood kitchens.



Proceeding to the Silent Auction, they placed bids on donated valuables and gift certificates from stores, restaurants, and museums. Reaching the Book Sale, they stocked up on second-hand volumes and CDs, taking advantage of the uniform price of just one dollar.

As dinner time approached, buyers and sellers joined forces to dismantle the stalls, to pack up the few remaining unsold items, to prepare the garbage pick up for the Sanitation Department, to transform the block back into a quiet residential neighborhood, and to congratulate themselves on raising \$6,500 to keep our community, safe, well-maintained, and beautiful.


