Known as the Edmark Program, trained teachers will instruct with IBM and United Way donated computers. This program, one of many, continues various summer activities.

As described by Estelle Orvitz, M.A. degreed teacher, at a recent Community Advisory Board meeting, her preschool and toddlers experienced a cornucopia of trips – to the Aquarium, Children's Museum, Central Park Zoo, cook-outs, Riverbank wading pool and Carousel, Battery Park, and more.

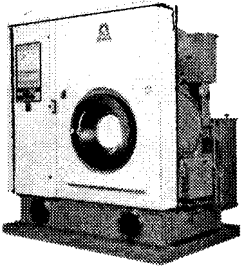

### In brief...

**Drug dealing** may – or may not – be on the upswing on 109<sup>th</sup> St. between Broadway and Amsterdam after a ten-year absence. As reported in *The New York Times* on October 6, residents say drug selling has increased recently but the police deny that.

According to an article in *The New York Times*, the **street crossing button** at the intersection of Riverside Dr. and 104<sup>th</sup> St. probably doesn't do what it was designed to do: cause the light to change so that pedestrians can cross. It seems that 80% of the buttons are at intersections where the traffic lights are on a fixed cycle and no amount of button pushing will cause the light to change any sooner. The buttons will be removed eventually.
