Groundbreaking for volunteer house in park

The ongoing viability of Riverside Park as a thriving public green space is closely linked to the thousands of hours contributed annually by Riverside Park Fund's Grassroots Volunteer Program to the beautification and maintenance of this natural resource. Working in partnership with the Parks Department, 2,700 individuals donated over 31,000 hours last year.

The Peter Jay Sharp Volunteer House, expected to be completed in spring 2003, will house Riverside Park Fund's Grassroots Volunteer Program. The project will restore the existing one hundred year old limestone building at 107th St. (originally a comfort station) and add a second floor. The new building will provide space for meetings, storage, and plant propagation. The stone retaining wall to the east will be stabilized and the surrounding paved areas will be replaced. The \$1.3 million project is completely privately funded and includes a permanent maintenance endowment. When completed, it will be the only public building in New York City dedicated solely to encouraging and sustaining volunteer park work.

Several block and area residents are Grassroots Volunteers: Ira and Karen Gershenhorn, Dru Heidle, and Teresa Elwert all of 320 Riverside, Elly Ledogar of 315 Riverside, Miriam Duhan of 309 W 104, and Estelle Kattelson of 925 West End. CB7 monitoring "quality of life" issues

The tourism downturn has prompted two local budget hotels--The Malibu on Broadway and 103rd Street and Broadway Studios on 101St--to contract with the city as temporary housing. Community Board 7 has been monitoring the situation and has asked the Mayor's Office to staff the shelters appropriately. Please notify CB7 if you notice any quality of life changes-increased panhandling, more litter, street fighting, etc. around the hotels. 103rd St. subway station rehabilitation

The rehabilitation of the 103rd, 110th, 116th, and 125th St. stations on the #1 line is on the fast track due to Columbia University's contributions to these stations. The rehabs are, in part, a celebration of Columbia's 250th anniversary and the subway system's 100th birthday. Work at 103rd St., which is not a landmarked station, should be completed by 2004.

Mosaics will be restored or replaced. At 103rd Street, in the middle of the Broadway Malls, where there used to be a head-house (demolished in 1967), a skylight will be installed, allowing natural light to enter the station. The skylight will be very low to the ground, and will not block any sight lines. It will also allow some ventilation into the station. Four potted trees in the malls where the skylight will be located will be replaced. The 104th Street exit on the uptown side will get two exit wheels, instead of the single one presently used. The project includes the installation of drains at the southbound platform. Structural repairs to the roof and ventilator structures are also included in the work to mitigate water infiltration.

The schedule for the station rehabs is as follows: The project will be advertised in September, awarded in December, and construction will begin in January 2003. During construction, one side of the stations will have closures for six weeks at a time. Some weekends will also see closures of all four stations.



Letter to the Editor:

As a resident of [905 WEA] for nine years, I feel a responsibility to share with the community my experience with Kay French Cleaners, which advertises in the Block Association newsletter.

All of my 21 lbs. of clothes, left for laundering at Kay, came back with ink stains, many of them severe. When I showed some of the clothes to Kay, they told me that they were going to try to remove the stain. If successful, they were then going to clean the rest. The clothes were not ready on two promised dates. When the clothes were finally declared finished, they were still severely stained and unwearable. I was then ordered to pay \$25 cleaning fee. When I challenged this, the mother, father, and son ordered me out of the store and shouted at me. They also made a clear and blatant racial remark during this interchange.

I have had no word from the Better Business Bureau of NYC Consumer Affairs, to whom I sent a complaint on July 22, 2002.


