Working hard for cleaner streets

For her first project as a board member Miriam Duhan has transformed herself into a diplomat. A car owner who parks on the street, she has been using gentle but effective persuasion to convince other owners to allow the mechanical broom to do its job before they re-park. She has also spoken to the driver of the broom asking him to take the time to let the drivers move out of the way. The car owners, many of whom either live or work on the block and park here regularly, agree with Miriam that our neighborhood should be as clean as possible. They're willing to cooperate with a grassroots effort to comply with the street cleaning regulations. Bravo, Miriam!

Con Ed problems

Two manholes on the block have been open for months while Con Ed does repairs underground. The openings are a serious hazard to pedestrians and cars. Estelle Kattelson, the community representative on the block association board, has enlisted the help of Community Board 7 in persuading Con Ed to finish the repairs and replace the manhole covers by the end of August, in plenty of time for the Yard Sale on September 20. We expect that the street light in front of 315 W. 104, which malfunctioned this winter, will be restored to its full power by then as well.

Parks Dept., Block Assn team up to battle rats

Rat sightings have increased in recent months in the pocket garden at the foot of 104th Street and the tot lot at 105th St. After receiving several complaints from block residents, the Block Association approached Ira Gershenhorn, who tends the garden, and Riverside Park administrator K.C. Sahl. Both agreed to bait the area. The block association underwrote Ira's efforts, and Sahl directed park workers to poison rat holes they find outside the tot lot. The baiting took place the last week in July. Within a week, seven rats had

succumbed. The Block Association is considering funding more baiting in the garden area, and has requested that park personnel continue to take steps to reduce the problem.

We Remember.....

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Know Your Neighbor And the winner is...... Dick Latessa!


"It is wonderful to finally be recognized by your peers," said our enthusiastic Tony Award winner, and neighbor at 320 Riverside, Dick Latessa. "I really love the theater and the stage." Dick won his Tony in June, 2003 for his portrayal of Wilbur Turnblad in the Broadway megahit *Hairspray*. He attributes the success of his performance to the instant and complete rapport that exists between him and Harvey Fierstein who plays Edna Turnblad. The casting of the Turnblad family, which also included Marissa Janet Winokur as Tracy, was inspired, and all three received Tonys for their work in the show.

Dick would never have believed as a boy in Cleveland that he would be in this position today. "I feel fortunate to have ended up where I ended up," Dick said, and quoted Roberto Benigni from his Oscar acceptance speech for *Life is Beautiful* when he said, "I thank my family for the gift of poverty." He grew up with five brothers and a sister, all of whom left school to work to make ends meet. His mother, widowed when Dick was only four years old, kept the family together by stitching automobile upholstery. As the youngest, Dick had the privilege of attending and finishing high school but he worked after school and during the summers as well, and had to work extra hard to amass enough money to buy a suit for his graduation. His first job after school was assembling vacuums for GE.

After a friend took him to a musical at the Karamu Theater in Cleveland, he decided he, too, had singing and acting talent. In 1959 after a few successful roles in Cleveland, he headed for New York. Soon he had his Equity card in his pocket and was busy with a variety of roles. His very long list of credits ranges from stage to film to television, and he has no intention of "retiring." After some thought, he admits that his favorite part, at least so far, was in *Philemon* in 1975 for which he won an Obie.

Dick and his wife raised three daughters in Manhattan, and Dick's profession allowed him to spend time with them daily in their growing-up years.

From 1967 to 1970 the family lived in California, but the lifestyle was not for them, and they all said, "Let's go home." "Home" for Dick is Manhattan, and he loves the 104th Street block, and his neighbors. His New York years have been spent on the Upper West Side, with a 12-year hiatus from 1986 to 1998 living on his farm in Goshen, New York. His commute then was 60 miles each way, but he loved the 15 acres, barn, stable and horses. He returned to Manhattan five years ago, and admits, "At my age, New York City is perfect."



His one "national tour" was for six months with *Cabaret*, which he could not have done from Goshen with daily farm and livestock commitments.. But from his apartment, it was just a matter of going out and locking the door. His daily routine lets him sleep until 10 in the morning. (If you call before that, be prepared to leave a voice message; he won't answer the phone.) He does his own shopping and cooking and rides the subway to and from the theater. He has owned a car and parked it on the street. But after it was stolen this spring, and found a week later, he decided to leave it with his brother in New Jersey.

Whenever you see this exuberant silver-haired gentleman, you can sense that he is thriving on his "work" which continues to give pleasure to all who see him - on stage and off.

Here's the Scoop

Our new Ben and Jerry's Scoop Shop's aesthetic and colorful décor adds additional flavor to the cornucopia of 15+ flavors of ice cream, frozen yogurt, sorbet. Carry out or eat in at tables colored mustard yellow, green, red, blue, or purple. Follow the standing cow to her Holstein buddy - green pasturing on the wall. A staff wearing black shirts proclaiming "104th St. & Broadway - Ben & Jerry" scoop their sweets into cups, waffle and sugar cones, smoothies and shakes. If you're not satiated, check out the ice cream and frozen yogurt cakes!

Table tops feature whimsical drawings and "historical" tidbits: Ben and Jerry, after a \$5 correspondence course in making ice cream, sold ice cream out of the back of their old VW around New England. Their Foundation uses 7.5% of profits for employment for under-served youth and adults. (At 104th St. they are working with the Regent Residence work training project.) This Scoop Shop is operated by Common Ground, a non-profit organization whose mission is to "end homelessness by creating innovative solutions that transform people, buildings and communities." On your way in and out, you might enjoy the exterior colorful, abstract mosaic pillar at the corner which was in place well before Ben and Jerry's.

The official opening is scheduled for Sept. 17 with a ribbon-cutting attended by Mayor Michael Bloomberg and Ben and Jerry's founders Ben Cohen and Jerry Greenfield among others. The store will give the neighborhood coupons for the "cold sweet stuff." (You can visit benjerry.com for more information about Scoop Shops.)
