### Scrumptious goodies wanted for Bakery



NY SAVE (Save Animals in Veterinary Emergency) was founded in 1998 by a group of veterinarians to provide funds to low-income pet owners who reside in the five boroughs. The funds are provided to aid owners whose pets need emergency care in the following situations:

Animal suffers from a condition that will affect its survival and well-being without veterinary care.

Sometimes pet owners find themselves facing a terrible

dilemma with their beloved animals...to put their pets to sleep, or not pay their rent or utilities, in order to pay for the emergency treatment their pets so desperately need.

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## The Quintessential Urban Tree: The Ailanthus

The ailanthus, the tree that grows in Brooklyn, is a street-smart tree. Brought from China to Philadelphia by a gardener in 1784 and introduced to California by Chinese miners during the gold rush, it is now growing wild from Canada to Argentina. It favors urban areas where it is found in vacant lots, along fences, railroad tracks, and highways. It tolerates polluted air laden with dust, industrial fumes, and traffic exhaust. It endures drought and cold and thrives in poor soil.

An array of survival skills help the ailanthus hold its own. It is a prolific seeder, scattering up to 325,000 windblown seeds per tree each year. It secretes toxins that suppress competing plants. Its roots spread fast, wide, and deep, frequently damaging sewers and foundations. It grows upward fast, too, averaging well over a yard per year during its first four years of growth.

Biologists trying to keep the ailanthus from overwhelming native trees in parks and preserves have had only limited success in controlling it. Like the cockroach, the ailanthus is here to stay.



Ailanthus leaves are compound and 18 to 24 inches long with 13 to 25 stalked, sharply-pointed, 3- to 5-inch-long leaflets. Each leaflet has 1 to 4 lobes near its base. The leaves are dark green and have an unpleasant odor when bruised.



The 1 1/2-inch-long ailanthus fruits, or samaras, each containing 1 seed appear in late summer and are sometimes green but may also be rosy red.


Symphony Space is closed for major renovations. The Thalia Theater will reopen in January 2002, and Symphony Space will reopen with Selected Shorts in February 2002.

### IF YOU LOOSE YOUR PURSE OR WALLET

- 1. Cancel your credit cards immediately—make sure you always have the toll free numbers and your card numbers available.
- 2. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where it was stolen. This proves to credit providers you were diligent, and is a first step toward an investigation - if there ever is one.
- 3. Call the national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and SS#. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.
