Citi-Bikes Are Coming To Our Neighborhood!

A Citi-Bike station is planned for our area in August. While a straw poll indicated that a majority of our residents are in favor of the new Citi-Bike station, many were concerned of the proposed location of the bikes. The Citi-Bikes are slated to be placed just north of W. 104th Street on Riverside Drive (park side). There was no statement as to the number of bikes at the station.

Our Community Board 7 recently held a public forum to hear comments about this location and some of our residents attended to voice their concerns. Many

felt it would be better served a few blocks north or south of W. 104th Street so as not to add to the congestion that already exists near the park entrance. CB7 members conducted a site visit at the proposed location and agreed that the area is congested and the placement of the bikes here may cause a safety issue due to the amount of pedestrian and vehicle traffic. They will propose to the Department of Transportation that the Citi-Bike station be located north of W. 103rd where there is no parking on the west side of southbound Riverside Drive.

A decision should come in July so monitor your emails and/or check our website at www.bloomingdale.org for updated information.

Mr. Thomas is visible by his orange vest and flashlight. His hours may vary according to season, but he is generally present between 4PM and midnight. His role is intended as a deterrent to unwanted and criminal activity on the street. He is not armed and does not function in the capacity of a police officer. Should criminal activity occur or a medical emergency arises, he is instructed to report it immediately to the appropriate agency. He is also available to escort you home in the evening.

He carries a dedicated phone and will meet you at either West End Ave or Riverside Drive. The phone number is 347-723-1517.

24th Precinct Community Council Meeting Trudie Grace

The meeting of May 20 primarily involved a presentation by Captain Marlon Larin, commanding officer. He noted that, in the twenty-eight day period ending May 17, there was a significant jump in grand larceny, largely attributable to identity theft. The latter often involves Social Security numbers on Medicare cards as well as charges on PayPal for non-existent events. Unattended property, including in Riverside Park, continues to be a problem. Car break-ins on the Upper West Side often target SUVs and vehicles with out-of-state plates.

Captain Larin also noted that crime in the transit system on the Broadway corridor is quite different than last year because of many more cases of pickpocketing, particularly involving females of Asian descent, the elderly, and sleepers, among them the inebriated. He added that there are at least three pick pocket teams working between Times Square and 116 Street and that they are good at spotting the police.

Captain Larin went through some of the most significant issues involving the "Broken Windows Policing" report, which has been in the news and is concerned with crime and police responses in NYC. Available online, it is controversial but has the support of NYC Police Commissioner William Bratton, who has recently defended initiatives underway.

One of two initiatives, among others, that Captain Larin discussed in detail is the Domain Awareness System involving license plate readers able to identify owners for whom there are arrest warrants, owners who are on a terrorist watch list, etc. A second initiative about which Captain Larin feels strongly utilizes neighborhood coordination officers trained to identify and address long-term problems by being steady points of contact and engendering trust.

Captain Larin invites community members to be in touch with him to discuss problems they see in the precinct and how the police can handle them better.

COMMUNITY CORNER

Secret Garden on West 97th Street


New York is a city of extremes—and that includes gardening. You may not fully appreciate the extreme efforts of volunteers in greening our city. Bryant, Riverside, and Central Parks—now gems—were recently dustbowls, full of trash and unsavory elements. When the city lacked the necessary resources, New Yorkers rolled up their sleeves to improve neighborhoods by gardening in vacant lots and abandoned park areas.

High atop a parking garage, hidden behind a gate and up a flight of stairs, The Lotus Garden (West 97th Street between Broadway and Amsterdam) is a beautiful and peaceful 7,000 sq.-foot urban oasis maintained by a small community of gardeners, many of whom are artists, and other volunteers. On the occasion of its 30th anniversary in 2014, a Times

article, "The Garage That Bloomed," highlighted the garden, which includes winding paths, fish ponds, fruit trees, herbs, flowering shrubs, and 28 individually designed and maintained garden plots. Twenty feet above the street, birds nest and sing, blooming flowers scent the air, truly local peaches grow, and sirens seem far away.

The Lotus Garden's origins can be traced back to 1977, when The Garden People began planting in a vacant lot at Broadway and 96th Street, the former site of the Riverside and Riviera movie theaters—where the Columbia condominium now stands. When the bulldozers arrived in 1981, this group got Parks Department permission to start a new garden in its current location (of *You've Got Mail* fame) in Riverside Park.

The Broadway site became the genesis of The Lotus Garden. Community opposition to suggested development projects led to an



organization of local block associations, gardeners, the City Planning Commission, Community Board 7, and the Trust for Public Land. The resulting committee, spearheaded by horticulturist Carrie Maher and architect Mark Greenwald, worked with real estate developer William Zeckendorf Jr. for over a year, and persuaded him to translate this neighborhood green space into an amenity that would enhance his new building. Zeckendorf built stairs to the roof of a parking garage from a gate on the street, a cherry picker lofted 3-1/2 feet of topsoil onto the roof, and the garden officially opened in 1984

The garden is open to the public on Sunday afternoons (1 to 4 PM) during gardening season, April through mid-November, unless the weather is

particularly inclement. Key holders have access to the garden during daylight hours, seven days a week. Membership for one year is \$20 and \$10 for seniors. To become a member, visit the garden on a Sunday afternoon during public hours and speak with a gardener on duty to purchase a key. (Regrettably, The Lotus Garden is not wheelchair accessible, as access to the garden requires climbing a flight of stairs.)

The garden is financed solely by dues from gardeners, annual membership fees from key holders, and donations from the public.

Please visit the garden on a Sunday afternoon! Look for the iron gate east of the parking garage on the south side of West 97th Street between Broadway and West End Avenue. Gardeners are on duty to answer any questions and sign up new key holders. All are invited to visit and experience this special place, become a community key holder, or volunteer. (Volunteering is often a preliminary step to becoming an active gardener.)
