## **Some Very Quiet Neighbors**

The statues near West 104th Street commemorate history—and scandal.

ithin a few minutes' walk of our block are some of New York's finest examples of public sculpture, each with a story behind it.

Probably the most beloved is the reclining female figure of Memory in Straus Park, at 106th Street and Broadway The touching statue and the entire park are a memorial to Isidor and Ida Straus, who died in the sinking of the Titanic in 1912. Straus, a civic leader and philanthropist, was the principal

owner of Macy's. The Straus home was at the northeast corner of 105th Street and West End Avenue, the site now occupied by 924 West End Avenue. The 1915 sculpture is by Henry Augustus Lukeman (1872-1935). His model was Audrey Munson (1891-1996), whose classic features and figure were reproduced in stone and bronze by several of America's most

prominent sculptors in the early 20th Century.

A block to the west, overlooking Riverside Drive at the foot of West 106th Street, is the equestrian statue of General Franz Sigel, a German-American educator, journalist, and politician. Sigel (1824-1902) was one of a wave of Germans who came to the United States in the wake of the failed revolutions of 1848. At the outbreak of the Civil War, he was instrumental in persuading large numbers of German immigrants to enlist in the Union cause. Sigel himself commanded troops in several battles, but with limited success. However, his importance in recruiting German immigrants led Lincoln to promote him to the rank of Major General. After the war, he was appointed to several government posts and was later

almy weather, brilliant sunshine and soaring spirits made the 31st Annual Yard Sale a success. Last year's event was cancelled due to the pandemic. So there was a sense of exhilaration as shoppers, sellers, volunteers and neighbors streamed up and down the block on September 25, remarking on the beautiful weather and celebrating being together again at a favorite event.

Live music added to the festivities. The Peter and Will Anderson Jazz

Quartet kicked off the afternoon with fresh riffs on jazz classics like "St. Louis Blues." Making a special appearance with the group was tuba player David Ostwald. The New Orleans sound was followed by classical guitarist Nora Spielman, a teacher at the nearby Bloomingdale School

of Music. And Shailah Edmonds rounded off the day's entertainment with rousing versions of Motown classics that—by the time she ripped into "Stop In the Name of Love"—had everyone dancing in the street.

When all was tallied, the Block Association earned \$7906 from the event, almost a record. The Book Table raked in \$1475, the Bake Table scored \$1630 with home-made treats, and the Silent Auction earned \$2711. The 50-50 raffle brought the Block Association \$1816, and generous winner Lynn Mandel donated \$1000 to the block from her share of the pot.

The board will use the Yard Sale revenues to undertake several long-postponed projects, including pruning the block's trees and restoring the guard patrol to six evenings a week.

The block's volunteers, residents, participants and donors are what makes the Yard Sale special. This year, we asked some of them what they felt about the event:

publisher of a German-language periodicals.

The statue is the work of Karl Bitter (1876-1915), another leading American sculptor of the early 20th Century. In addition to several statues of military heroes, Bitter created the figure of Pomona, the Roman goddess of abundance, atop the Pulitzer Fountain at Fifth Avenue and 59th Street. Tragically, Bitter had done only the plaster maquette of the goddess when he was killed in an automobile accident. The statue was completed by his fellow sculptor Isidore Konit, using Audrey Munson as his model.

#### TRIBUTE TO HEROISM

Six blocks south on Riverside Drive at 100th St., is the Firemen's Memorial, built at the suggestion of Bishop Henry C. Potter to honor New York Firemen who had died in the line of duty. It was dedicated in 1913. Isidor Straus, who had perished on the Titanic the previous year, had led its fund-raising committee. The monument was designed by architect H. Van Buren Magonigle.

The two allegorical sculptural groups on either side are titled "Duty" and "Sacrifice," each with a seated female figure and child. Both are by Attilio Piccirilli (1866-1945), one of six sons in a family of stone carvers who emigrated to the U.S. from Italy in 1888. At their studio in the Bronx, the Piccirillis made a

specialty of carving enlarged stone versions of the clay or plaster models made by the original sculptors. Their most famous project is the 19-foot-high figure of the seated Lincoln at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, scaled up from the original by Daniel Chester French. Attilio, however, was a sculptor in his own right. Among his other works in New York are the Maine Monument at Columbus Circle and the sculpture on the exterior of Riverside Church. Piccirilli's model for the female figures of "Duty" and "Sacrifice" was Audrey Munson. In 1919 she was caught up in a scandal involving a love-addled former landlord who murdered his wife in order, he claimed, to marry Audrey. She denied any romantic involvement with him, but her career was ruined. In 1931, she was committed to an upstate insane asylum where she remained for the next 65 years until her death at the age of 104.




## Back with a Bang

It was an all-day celebration at the 31st Annual Yard Sale. The crowds came, the music soared, and the sun shown down on West 104th Street.












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
