

Meet the Block's New Pin Oak A board member's tireless efforts finally take root. By Joyce Mann

urray! After almost five years of waiting, hoping, nudging, complaining, and pestering, and dozens of phone calls and emails, the City finally planted a beautiful pin oak sapling in front of 309 West 104th Street. It's been a long and difficult process because it involved outreach to three separate departments of the Parks Department, one to remove the dead stump that was still there, and

one to actually plant the tree. And none of the departments had contact with the other. Oy.

The Block Association made its first request to the Parks Department in the spring of 2018. We were put on a citywide list. We made no progress in two years, and then Covid struck, shutting down many of the city's non-essential services for two more years.

The next hurdle was that Manhattan Forestry, the department responsible for the stump removal, had old maps that showed utility lines underneath the stump or in its immediate vicinity. This got our original

request frozen and prolonged our efforts for another year and a half. Eventually, we were able to prove that their information was wrong. Kudos to Priscilla Lin at the Parks Department who helped expedite the process along with Bob Weinberg, the board president of 309 West 104th Street and Steve Zirinsky, our Block Association president. They provided the correct information to the agency and persisted with their requests, even calling in the assistance of our then city council member Gale Brewer. It took all of us to convince the city it was safe to remove the stump. However, the Forestry Department did not have that updated information, so nearly a year ago we had to start over with a new request.

Then, out of the blue in November, we saw that the stump had continued on page 3

Capped off with another successful Yard Sale—even with the change of dates due to the weather and with Con Ed digging in the street! It was the busiest in terms of numbers


of people that I have ever seen.

We Need Your Help! Please Report Our Garbage and Rodent Problem

The Block Association needs concerned residents to help flag the rodent problem on our block to the City. If the City receives enough complaints, they will send an inspector to the block and take action against buildings that are not handling their garbage properly. Rats come if they have food to forage. If you see open garbage containers, garbage left outside of containers, rodent activity or signs of rodent activity, please call 311, or use the 311 app to report a "Rat or Mouse Condition." The person handling the complaint will need the address of the building where the problem occurred and the location type (apartment building, store, etc.). You will be asked if what you saw is a hole or burrow, open garbage or a rat. Please take a few minutes to help us get our block cleaned up. It's an essential step in getting our rodent problem under control.

The Broadway Star Deli is the newest addition to the neighborhood food scene. It opened on the northwest corner of 104th and Broadway a little less than two months ago, but already has been drawing fans of its food, especially its handmade sandwiches.

According to the manager Mohammed and his assistant Ali what makes their establishment different from the other neighborhood delis they both said that their food is fresh

products and pride ourselves on four points: freshness, quality, taste and customer service," says Mohammed.

The store has chicken and organic meats delivered regularly, including the jumbo shrimp for the shrimp salad. They made their own sauces. "Our most popular grilled sandwich so far is the chopped ground beef with onions and peppers and your choice of cheese, on a roll, panini or rice," says Mo-

hammed. Other popular items are the Philly cheese steak, pepper steak, falafel or grilled pork as a platter with rice and salad. "We feature a huge salad bar with only the freshest of ingredients, says Ali. He added that his motto is, "If I don't want to eat it, I won't serve it to a customer." The store also makes fresh smoothies and you can have your morning coffee with bagels, cream cheese and even lox and capers.

"Our most popular convenience items so far are the Nutella biscuit cookies; we order them by the case," says Mohammed. "We also have a line of kosher cookies "Sweet Sam" and specialty items such as high quality protein bars, Omega brand powders to make protein shakes and Haagen Dazs ice cream."

Because Broadway Star deli is a new business, their website isn't fully operational yet, but they will take phone orders for pick up and will deliver upon request. Their phone number is: 646-964-5320. Says Mohammed, "We look forward to serving the community with pride."
