# **A Community of Cooks**

Allrecipes' manager Molly Fergus talks about the site's special flavor.

s the days shorten, the wind turns chilly and holidays offer more opportunities to gather, one of the greatest comforts is cooking at home. If you're like me, you've turned to Allrecipes as an online staple for inspiration and guidance. Allrecipes is a vast online resource that can help you navigate nearly any cooking or baking project you could conceive of. But did



you know that our block is home to a leader who helps run this website? I sat down with block resident Molly Fergus to learn more about the joys of home cooking-whether it's trying something new or sticking with comforting favorites-and how our friendly community fuels her.

How long have you worked at Allrecipes, and what are your main **responsibilities there?** I've worked at Allrecipes since 2021, and I've been at our parent company, Dotdash Meredith, since 2013. I'm the SVP and General Manager for Allrecipes, which means I'm responsible for the editorial and business strategy. I help determine our editorial calendar for the year, partner with sales on ad campaigns, and work with our tech team to build new tools on site. Oh, and I get to try an inordinate amount of gimmicky new snack foods we're sent to cover-pumpkin spice pretzel chips are actually quite good!

What do you find unique about Allecipes? Allrecipes began as a user generated recipe site, meaning that every recipe was submitted by home cooks from across the country, not made in a test kitchen by recipe developers. When you make one of our recipes, you're recreating someone's grandma's comforting casserole or favorite chocolate chip cookies. There is a real sense of community on the site.

What are some of your favorite recipes? We are at the start of soup and stew season, so I've been stocking our freezer with continued on page 3

this simple but satisfying Greek lentil stew (don't skip the drizzle of vinegar at the end!) (https://www.allrecipes.com/recipe/137650/ greek-lentil-soup-fakes/); I've got a big batch of birria waiting for a rainy night (https://www.allrecipes.com/recipe/235755/birriarecipe/); and I've taken to blackening chicken or shrimp when we need a quick but not boring dinner at home (https://www.allrecipes. com/recipe/263391/blackened-shrimp/)

How did you end up working there? I studied magazine journalism in college and moved to New York to see if could make it in publishing. I started in the digital travel space, at Conde Nast Traveler, then moved to my current company to launch TripSavvy. When we acquired Meredith and Allrecipes in 2021, I knew I was ready for a change and asked to move to the food category. After all, half the reason I travel has always been to eat; this felt like a natural fit.

# **Planet Friendly Holiday Gift Guide 2024**

he holidays are coming! "Tis the season to be jolly" the carol goes. But for many of us right now, that's a tall order. Want to chase the blues away? Make a commitment to work locally to ensure a clean, healthy environment in your neighborhood. As Barack Obama reminds us, "Change will not come if we wait for some other person or some other time. We are the ones we've been waiting for. We are the change that we seek."

#### **Gifts for Your Community**

Give the gift of keeping your neighborhood clean and healthy by joining the Sanitation Foundation's "Adopt Your Spot" program (www.sanitationfoundation.org). You adopt a nearby spot to keep clean on a regular basis (tree guard, storm drain, gutter etc.) This keeps debris and plastic litter from washing down the drains and becoming microplastics which pollute the water, animals and us. Enlist the help of a neighbor or child.

Stay in touch with our elected officials to let them know what needs addressing in our neighborhood climate wise. They are often looking for legislative ideas. If they don't hear from constituents how will they know what's needed? Shaun Abreau represents us on the New York City Council, Micah Lasher will represent us in the State Assembly starting in January and Cordelle Cleare is our State Senator.

#### Gifts for the Kitchen

Give non-Teflon coated cookware. Why? Teflon-coated pans contain PFAS, toxic chemicals used to make plastic which when heated leach into our food. Choose from these non-stick choices like Caraway Cookware or Greenpan.

Give a zero waste cookbook. Why? In the U.S. we waste 60 mil-

lion tons of food a year! Consider The Zero Waste Cookbook and The Zero Waste Chef. Now that mandatory composting is here, give a stylish countertop food scrap countertop bin. Consult Wirecutter for good suggestions or shop local at University Hardware.

#### **Give Experiences**

Consider getting memberships to museums, botanical gardens (like Wave Hill in Riverdale), New York Society Library and the Joyce Theater. In our neighborhood, consider giving dance lessons at Bridge for Dance or music lessons at Bloomingdale School of Music. Or you can give pottery lessons at Supermud Pottery or tennis lessons in Riverside Park (visit www.tennisinnovators .com), or knitting classes at Knitty City a little further down the West Side.

#### For Kids

Help younger children learn to enjoy nature with gifts from Thimble and Twig. For teens, check out www.powerfulyouth.com, which has a teen sustainable gift guide.

#### No Cost Gifts

Help a friend or family member with an organizing project. Examples include; a leftover container drawer (toss out plastic containers and suggest replacing with glass, metal or silicone); a clothes closet: donate little worn clothes to local Housing Works; a book shelf; an underused toy bin; the pantry.

Most importantly this holiday season, hold your loved ones close, donate to environmental organizations and efforts to bring peace in the world. Keep hope alive.
